

# Art (AR)

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## **AR 1300. Concepts in Visual Art. 3 Semester Hours.**

A study of the formal and conceptual aspects of art and art making including: the visual elements, principles of design, art production/media as well as a historical perspective through the study major periods and styles of art from the ancient world to contemporary issues as well as the conceptual aspects of what artists do and why. The student will be exposed to a wide variety of art making and themes from throughout history from the painting on cave walls to formal contemporary concerns as well as issues of gender, race, and social issues in public art. While the course is lecture/presentation based the student will also experience several studio assignments designed to augment lecture/presentations, as well as exposure to gallery, and museum visits either virtually, or in person with the intention of using newfound vocabulary established in the course.

## **AR 1301. Drawing I. 3 Semester Hours.**

Designed to develop the student's understanding of basic skills in drawing through a variety of approaches including: sighting, contour line, gesture drawing, additive/subtractive process, compositional studies, value studies, hatching and grid techniques using a variety of drawing materials to include: pencils, marker, ink, charcoal, and mix media. ## **AR 1302. Drawing II. 3 Semester Hours.**

Continuation of Drawing I. Further investigation of drawing as a developmental process in perceptual and conceptual skills. Additional fee associated with this course. See fee schedule for details at <https://www.stmarytx.edu/admission/financial-aid/tuition/>.

## **AR 1311. Design fundamentals. 3 Semester Hours.**

Introduction to the elements and principles of art using line, color, form, texture, and shape with emphasis in two-dimensional design. Additional fee associated with this course. See fee schedule for details at <https://www.stmarytx.edu/admission/financial-aid/tuition/>.

## **AR 1312. Color Theory. 3 Semester Hours.**

This course will introduce the student to color as a descriptive and expressive element of art, focusing on color perception and practical application.

## **AR 2301. Three Dimensional Concepts: An Introduction to Sculpture. 3 Semester Hours.**

An introduction to sculptural form: fundamentals of art with emphasis in three dimensional problems including the use of paper, clay, plaster, metal, and wood.

## **AR 2321. Painting I. 3 Semester Hours.**

Techniques, fundamental color theories, and composition. Principal medium is oil or acrylic. Recommended prerequisite: AR 1301 (Drawing I) or AR 1311 (Design Fundamentals).

## **AR 2361. History of Art: Ancient through Medieval. 3 Semester Hours.**

## **AR 2362. History of Art: Renaissance to Present. 3 Semester Hours.**

## **AR 3331. Sculpture. 3 Semester Hours.**

Structural form using options in clay techniques.

## **AR 3341. Art Problems. 3 Semester Hours.**

Allows option of working in media of student's choice and encourages exploration of individual expression. Art Education majors will work to develop individual professional portfolios in preparation for teaching. Prerequisite: 9 hours of art and approval of faculty.

## **AR 3351. Printmaking. 3 Semester Hours.**

Exploration and application of basic techniques of printmaking, which includes processes in producing multiples of the original image.

## **AR 3381. History of Art Applied. 3 Semester Hours.**

This course is a survey of painting, sculpture, architecture and other arts from prehistoric times to the modern world. Students will be introduced to the essential elements of visual art and to experiences in creative two and three dimensional media for children. Fall.

## **AR 3392. Photography. 3 Semester Hours.**

The photography course provides an overview of tools and techniques in relations to the history of photography. As the student studies each era in the advances in the art, they will be experiencing what it would be like to be of the first inventors. The course will start by working with primitive photography and eventually move into the possibilities of digital imaging.

## **AR 4191. Special Topics in Art. 1 Semester Hour.**

Independent study or seminar, arranged with staff. Consent of departmental faculty required. May be repeated for up to six hours of credit.

## **AR 4291. Special Topics in Art. 2 Semester Hours.**

Independent study or seminar, arranged with staff. Consent of departmental faculty required. May be repeated for up to six hours of credit.

## **AR 4322. Painting II. 3 Semester Hours.**

Composition, surface quality emphasis, and experimentation in acrylic or oil medium. AR 2321.

**AR 4323. Digital Art Studio. 3 Semester Hours.**

This course develops fundamental skills in using computer graphic tools and related peripheral devices for creating digital artworks that reference the traditional look of painting and drawing media. The class will focus on creating original works on the computer that reflect the student's creative interests. The student will be encouraged to experiment and explore unique ways of creating artwork using digital applications. Emphasis will be placed upon using the computer for conceptual and aesthetic problem-solving.

**AR 4391. Special Topics in Art. 3 Semester Hours.**

Independent study or seminar, arranged with staff. May be repeated for up to six hours of credit.

**AR 4691. Special Topics in Art. 6 Semester Hours.**

Independent study or seminar, arranged with staff. Consent of departmental faculty required. May be repeated for up to six hours of credit.
